#### **CHAPTER**

## **Statement & Arguments**

  pollution so cannot be completly banned. Argument
  (C) is based on example which is a bad argument.
- 3. (d) Argument (A) is strong because due to shortage of space in big cities in India high rise building should be encouraged.
- 4. (c) Only Argument (C) is strong because to avoid the inconvenience of commuters, repair work is advisable in night only.
- 5. (c) Only Argument (A) and (C) are strong because compromise with level of education cannot be done.
- 6. (a) Option (a) would weaken the argument put forward by the committee to the sports ministry.

- 28. (c) After a cautioned gap of one month people have started visiting crowded places most substantiates the facts.
- 29. (a) Educating the school going children on politics will definitely acquaint them with the intricacies and modalities of the same thus help them to make informed decision. Hence, argument I is strong.
- 30. (a) (i) most accurately defines term "implicit bias" as the word automatic was used which is similar to the term "unintentionally racist" used by researchers.
- 31. (b) Argument I is not strong because it does not tell that why the grievances of people will increase. Argument II is strong because it will reduce the power theft which has resulted in a huge amount of losses.
